What is Legacy?

Legacy is about using the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games to create a lasting and valuable benefit for the community, the economy and the environment. Making them:

Better, sooner, together through sport

Legacy is ...

- Based on a vision for the future you want to see.
- Things that can only happen because we are hosting the Games.
- Things that address genuine opportunities or significant challenges.
- Things we are already doing that are made bigger and better, or happen sooner because of Brisbane 2032.
- Things that happen before, during or in the ten years after the Games.
- For the benefit of as many communities as possible.

Legacy is NOT ...

- Projects, policies, programs or other initiatives that are business as usual.
- Short term, and with benefits for only a small number of people.
- Ideas that don't have any relationship to the Games.
- Projects, policies, programs or other initiatives that can't realistically be delivered.

Building our shared legacy from Brisbane 2032 can start now and continue for generations to come.

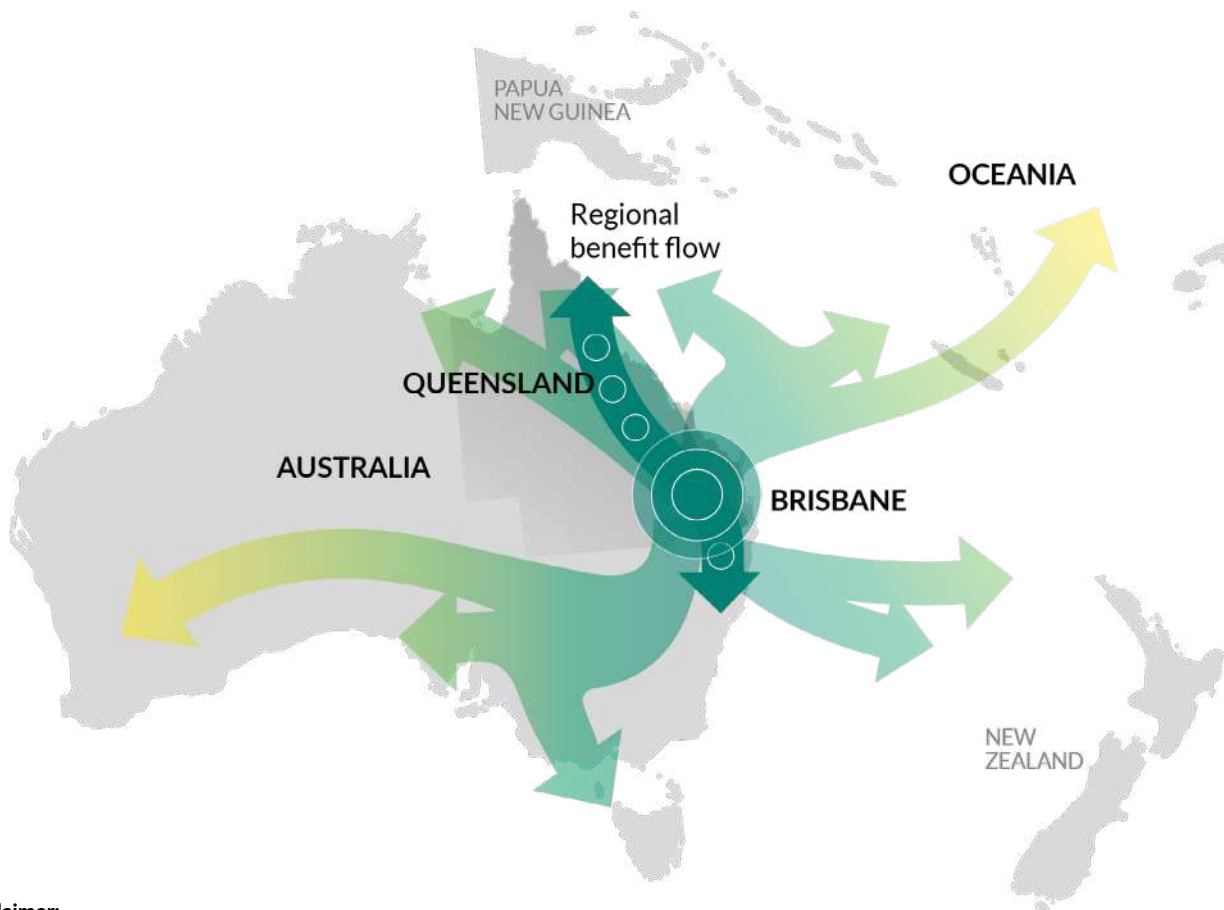

Our draft vision is:

It is a plan about creating better futures for people and places. The vision and themes will continue to be developed through consultation.

Our draft themes

Celebrating the World's Oldest Living Cultures will be at the heart of Brisbane 2032 and it will be at the heart of our Legacy Plan. Intrinsic throughout the engagement process is also the importance of creating an inclusive, accessible and barrier free society for people with disability. These provide two important lenses through which our Legacy Plan is being brought to life.

Sport, Health and Social Inclusion

Desired Outcomes

- A more physically active, and healthy community.
- Enhanced pathways for elite athletes, including First Nations and people with disability.
- Improved equity within and between our regions.
- Increased inclusion and accessibility for vulnerable or marginalised communities.
- Stronger gender equity, increasing the attraction, enablement and retention of women in sport.



Some of the ideas we have heard so far through the community engagement process:

Sport for Every Child

School and community sport funded to allow every child to participate at least once a week.

Oceania of Sport

Building pathways for community and elite athlete participation across the Oceania region - including coaching, mentoring, scholarship and inspiration.

Paralympic Centre of Excellence

A training, athlete development and accreditation facility to enhance research and participation for all athletes with disability.

Volunteer Passport

Build the volunteering culture, skills and capacity to deliver a great games and grow volunteers in sport and community activities.

Indigenous Excellence in Sport

An innovative program that attracts and develops First Nations athletes across Queensland, Australia and Oceania.

Sporting Futures Fund + Regional Sporting Hubs

Enable community clubs to access the training and resources they need for athletes to remain in their home regions - for the benefit of both the athlete and their community.

Olympic and Paralympic Housing Trust

Explore potential for using the athletes' villages across the region to help address affordable housing supply.

Elite Athlete Pathway Program

Support for high performance athletes at every stage of their career.

Some of the ideas we have heard so far through the community engagement process:

Legacy Forests

Enhance biodiversity, reduce carbon and cool the Earth by investing in an Olympic forest or planting a tree for every ticket sold.

Zero Waste to Landfill by 2032

Support a low carbon, circular economy through the introduction of enhanced waste management and material passports for all new venues and infrastructures.

Biodiversity Credits

Develop a state wide trading scheme to allow corporates to invest in the protection and regeneration of our most special natural places.

Water Sensitive Regions

Protect and restore water bodies across our cities and regions to enhance our blue ecosystem.

Most Sustainable Venues

Our Olympic and Paralympic venues have the smallest environmental footprint possible, and sustainable economic and social legacies.

2042 Living Environment “Museum”

A natural history museum without walls - created by packaging the most iconic natural places in Queensland into a singular online and lived experience.

Introduce Environmental Science to School Curriculum

Mandatory education for all children in Queensland to enable a culture of environmental responsibility.

Deliver Great Local Places and Precincts that Connect Communities

Invest in creating vibrant places and precincts in our cities, towns and regional areas.

First Nations Cultural “Experience”

An iconic building that tells the stories of the world’s oldest living cultures, in their own way. A place for truth-telling, truth-hearing, creativity and cultural expression.

A Future-Fit Transport System for South East Queensland

Enhanced and inclusive mass transit solution that unlocks other legacy benefits for South East Queensland.

First Nations Language and Culture

Celebrate the local languages through signage, naming conventions, stories, school curriculum and the Opening Ceremony.

Develop Digital Solutions that Create Regional Opportunities

Invest in digital infrastructure and partnerships to enhance equity and accelerate economic outcomes.

Universal Access

All Olympic and Paralympic venues, precincts, live sites and infrastructure are accessible to everyone.

Understanding what is important to you helped frame the Legacy Forum; creating four key Legacy themes for deeper conversations.

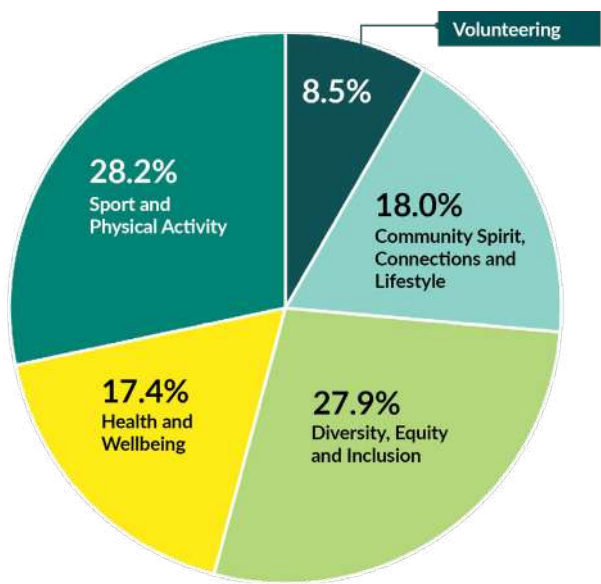

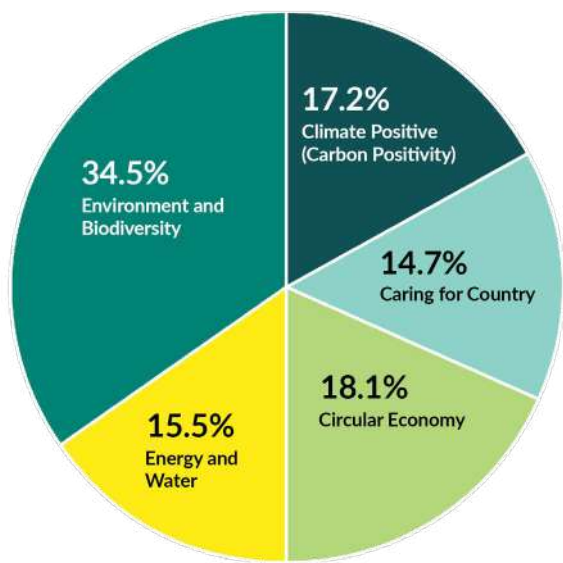
Brisbane 2032 Legacy Forum
